### Litter Laws in Deep South States



**Alabama:** Minimum fine of \$500 for first littering conviction. Second and any subsequent convictions bring \$1000 fine and up to 100 hours cleaning up litter. Additional penalty for improper disposal of cigarettes or food containers is \$500.

**Florida:** Drivers are responsible for any littering from their vehicles. If convicted, a litterer can be fined up to \$500 or jailed for up to 60 days. You can be charged with a first-degree misdemeanor and fined up to \$1,000 if dumping more than 15 pounds of trash.

**Georgia:** Anyone caught littering can be ordered to pay a fine of up to \$1,000 or more. Convicted litterers can also be ordered to clean up a littered area in a community. The driver is responsible for any litter leaving a vehicle. Illegally dumping more than 500 pounds is considered a misdemeanor on the first offense. A second conviction is a felony, punishable by a fine of up to \$25,000 or a prison sentence of up to two years (or both).

**Louisiana:** If convicted of littering, you face a fine between \$175 and \$1000, and up to 8 hours of a litter abatement work program. If litter flies out of the back of a truck, it carries up to \$175 in fines and court costs. Cigarettes thrown from a vehicle carry a \$500 fine and a litter abatement work program.

**Mississippi:** If caught throwing litter from your vehicle, you can be fined up to \$250.

**Tennessee:** All littering between five and 10 pounds is criminal littering, a Class B misdemeanor. If convicted, pay a \$500 fine, and court cost, and shall do public service pickup for up to 80 hours; may do work in a recycling center for up to eight hours; and may do up to six months jail time.

It is time to start working on your applications for the 2023 Awards. Remember you can only win if you apply, apply, apply!

I am Roxanna Champagne, the 2023-2025 DSGC Awards Chairman. I am excited to receive your award applications. I know your clubs and states have done some awesome projects and you deserve to be rewarded for your achievements.

Please download the revised 2023-2025 DSGC Awards Procedures and read them carefully. There are some new chairmen that will be judging the awards, so make sure you have the latest version of awards. If you downloaded the award procedures before August, you need to go to the Deep South website to download the latest version that was uploaded to the website after August 5, 2023. Most award applications should be sent via email. There are some that need be mailed such as Publicity Press Books, Flower Show Schedules and Yearbooks.

The Youth Awards have also had some changes. The poetry contest theme is "I Spy with My Little Eye, Something Green Outside Celebrating Our Green World". The 2024 Smokey Bear Poster Contest is dedicated to Smokey Bear only, as he will turn 80 years old in 2024.

**Remember** that your awards need to come from your State Awards Chairmen, not individual members or clubs. If the award application does not come from the State Awards Chairman, it will not be eligible to win. Check the deadlines also, as there may be different deadlines for some awards.

# Deep South Unified Project

## “Decorate the Deep South, with a Focus on Flower Shows, Floral Design and Colorful Public Buildings.”

Most Deep South Garden Club members are well aware of Director Cooper’s love of flower shows and floral design in general. In keeping with that interest, she has chosen to promote flower shows, decorating a public space with flowers, and colorful plantings with her Deep South Unified Project, along with money awards in each category.

### NGC Flower Show

The club with the highest scoring NGC Flower Show will be awarded \$200, with

\$100 for second place.

The same award is offered for a show staged by a group of clubs or

council. A Flower Show Book of Evidence is required to apply for the award and will be judged according to the NGC Scale of Points.

### Floral Decoration for Public Event or Space

This unique award is offered for floral creations that decorate a public space or for a special event. This could be for a wedding, a public reception, or any other special event. Decorating a library with floral designs for a special event could qualify. Cash awards of \$200 for first place

and \$100 for second place are offered for individual club entries and entries from a group of clubs or a council. A book of evidence is required that is compiled according to DSGC Award Rules.



### Colorful Planting(s)

Deep South Garden Clubs are known for wonderful planting projects in their communities.



Money awards of \$200 for first place and \$100 for second place are offered for both individual club entries and a group of clubs or council for a colorful planting project. A

Book of Evidence must meet DSGC Awards Rules.

### State Competition

Deep South is also offering \$200 to the state with the highest-scoring State Flower Show.

### Overall Award

An additional cash award of \$250 will go to the overall winner in the Club Competitions.

# Deep South Garden Clubs Scholarships

## *“Education is the Transportation to Our Future”*

The Deep South Garden Clubs, Inc., Scholarship Program offers financial aid to a qualified student sponsored by a Member State Federation in the Deep South Region. The students should be majoring in any garden or environmental-related subject and enrolled in an accredited college or university.

Two (2) scholarships, in the amount of \$3,500 each, are available annually. One-year scholarships are available to juniors, seniors, and graduated students pursuing a Master’s Degree. Sophomores may make application for their junior year. The college/university must be listed on the official Web site of the U.S. Department of Education. The annual grant is dispersed to the designated university by August 15<sup>th</sup>.

Students in each DSGC Member State are eligible to apply to their state’s DSGC Scholarship Chairman. The completed application and supporting documents must be sent to the State Garden Club Chairman for the state in which the applicant is a legal resident, even if the student is attending an out-of-state school, to be received no later than February 1<sup>st</sup>.

Most folks think of Florida as an ideal vacation spot, but for those of us who live here, we are very busy all year round!

From 18 June until 27 July, the Florida Federation hosted our annual **Wekiva Youth Camp**, an environmental overnight camp for over 600 children in first to ninth grades. They spend a week in a tech-free zone learning about different aspects of nature, doing related crafts, and swimming, biking, canoeing, singing, and competing! This was our 49<sup>th</sup> summer at the Wekiva Springs State Park facility. *Newsweek*

magazine included Wekiva Youth Camp in their 2023 ranking of *Best Summer Camps* in the country! This year we dedicated a new office and clinic building, replacing the one that burned

down 4 years ago. A garden club member was our benefactor and paid for the construction and furnishings. The dedication was held June 15.

Approximately 40 high school students from all over the state enjoyed a 3-day conference at the University of Florida entitled “Saving the Earth’s Environment through Knowledge” (**Seek.**) Their course of study increases student environmental literacy through hands-on and field-based educational experiences, inspires student interest and involvement in environmental conservation and protection, and promotes student development of environmental stewardship ethics as well as environmental career opportunities. Through generous donations from our garden club members, all students attending were on scholarship.

Our garden club members were able to enjoy two 2-day educational opportunities in our **Short Course** series of study. UF/FFGC Short Course was held in Gainesville in June, and Short Course North was held in Pensacola in August. Garden club members and Master Gardeners were treated to research-based information about soils, water, plants, lawns, and other useful and current topics. NGC-accredited Gardening, Landscape, and Environmental consultants earned renewal credits while Master Gardeners were able to receive CEU credits. Everyone learns something new at Short Course!

Plans for the **100th-anniversary** celebration of the Florida Federation of Garden Clubs are ongoing. The planning committee spent time this summer contracting speakers, vendors, workshops, and programs. The schedule for the biennial state flower show, to be held in conjunction with the convention, has been written and will be introduced at our September Board of Directors meeting. This will be an NGC Major Flower Show! The celebration will be held April 10-12, 2024 in Jacksonville, where our foremothers first gathered to create this organization. We have certainly come a long way!

This fall we will return to our garden club year with more **educational happenings**, including Flower Show School, a Flower Show School Symposium, Floral Design Study classes, two Landscape Design schools, Gardening Study School, and two Environmental schools...some of these are by Zoom so all can join in the fun!

As I travel this great state I marvel at the diverse beauty and inspiration of the land and the people in our federation that love gardening.

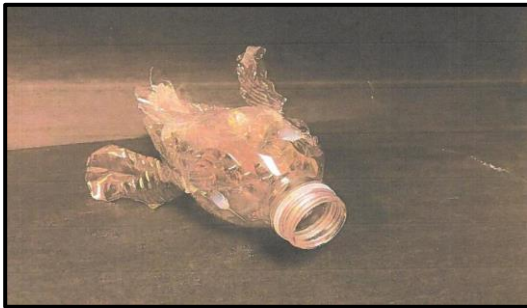
## NGC Youth Contests
